**Fall 2018 Seminar Series: “Emerging Foreign and Security Dimensions”**

The Liechtenstein Institute on Self-Determination will host a special seminar, divided in three interrelated modules. The seminar will discuss emerging foreign policy & security challenges and the relevant Institutions to respond. It will provide an overview about key institutions in security and foreign relations in the World’s Northern Hemisphere: the OSCE, EU, SCO, and ASEAN. Challenges from strategic developments, inter-state and intra-state perspectives, self-determination, cyber, climate and environmental issues, to migration and leadership challenges in the region spanning from Vancouver to Vladivostok. The seminar will explain the institutional set up, look at the origins and institutionalization, examine security challenges through the prism of the organizations; offer specific insights on negotiations and interactions and pursue a comparative perspective with an emphasis of involving diplomatic and political practitioners from within and outside the organization.

The seminar is divided into three modules:

**(i.) *The OSCE, The EU, SCO, ASEAN - The Institutions and Relevant Dimensions*; Thursday to Saturday, September 27-29, 2018, Public Roundtable, Thursday, September 27.**

**(ii.) *Challenges and Crises in the OSCE Realm: from Vancouver to Vladivostok*; Thursday to Saturday, October 18-20, 2018, Public Roundtable, Thursday, October 18.**

**(iii.) *The Emerging Quadripartite Relationship: USA - EU/Europe - Russia - China*; Thursday to Saturday, November 15-17, 2018, Public Roundtable, Thursday, November 15.**

Note: Participating students are required to attend from Noon Friday to Saturday, complete brief assignments/commentary (ca 2,000 words) after each seminar and compose a ca 6,000-word final paper by end of Fall Semester. Selected papers will be presented at an international meeting abroad at Spring 2019. **Please indicate if you cannot attend any of the three scheduled seminars.**

Student participants will be chosen from a variety of departments and programs, bringing their specific academic backgrounds, interdisciplinary methodologies, and professional experiences to bear on key issues related to religion and international politics. PORDIR fellows have used their research as a basis for academic publication, future thesis and dissertation work, and have utilized their research through the course of internships at places such as the UN, State Department, and a variety of international governments, media outlets, and NGOs.
